Course Description

- This is a required course for the MA in Geography. The focus of this course is how geographic research is conducted and what the components of your thesis or final research paper will need
- If you have not selected a thesis advisor, this course will help you identify who the best advisor would be based on your proposed research
- The primary goal of this course is to help you identify a research question and to develop a proposal that includes a literature review and methodology for answering the research question

Learning Outcomes:

- Be able to explain the fundamental concepts, theories, and research methods in geography
- Be able to discuss and explain the ethics, laws, and responsibilities in human subjects research
- Be able to apply the scientific method to analyzing various forms of qualitative and quantitative geographic data
- Be able to define a research question and write a literature review that gives a context to the question
- Be able to develop an appropriate methodology for answering a research question
- Be able to demonstrate the structure of scientific writing through the writing of a research proposal
